Cars Blocking Your Driveway? Contact DPT for a Red Zone

City College commuters and residents who own multiple vehicles create a great deal of demand for street parking in Sunnyside. Driveway red zones are intended to discourage parking in driveways and provide additional turning clearance.

To apply for a red zone, send a letter with the property owner's signature to:

Department of Parking and Traffic 25 Van Ness Avenue San Francisco, CA 94102.

The standard fee for a driveway red zone is \$55. You should hear from DPT in four to six months. Consideration is given to both the preservation of adjacent parking spaces and driveway ingress and egress.

It is illegal for you to paint your own curb. Red zones without the "DPT" stencil have no legal standing and will not be enforced by DPT or the police. •

Join District 7's Clean Sweep During March!

District 7, including our own Sunnyside, is the focus in March of the Community Clean Team. City departments, not-for-profit organizations, merchants, community groups and residents will join forces to pick up litter and clean streets and sidewalks.

Two ways to get involved:

Saturday, March 16, meet at the Bufano Statue Parking Lot south of Brotherhood Way for Volunteer in the Parks Day. Focus of this effort will be on beautifying long-neglected Lake Merced.

Saturday, March 23, meet at St. Finn Barr School, 415 Edna, for community clean-up projects.

Primary sponsor of the Clean Team is the Department of Public Works, Bureau of Street Environmental Services. Supervisor Theresa McGrath of BSES spoke at the February SNA meeting, outlining plans for the month and encouraging neighbors to participate in this effort to improve our local environment. Efforts are already underway, with groups tackling clean-up projects at area schools last Saturday.

Saturday, April 6, 10:00 to 12 noon, the Community Design Meeting for Sunnyside Conservatory will be held in main social hall of St. Finn Barr Church, 415 Edna at Hearst, just a few blocks from the Conservatory. Be there as proposed designs are unveiled for a restored and fully accessible Conservatory and garden—destined to become a neighborhood anchor and gathering place!

Over the past several months, the Conservatory Design Team composed of Friends of Sunnyside Conservatory and architects, planners and landscape architects from the SF Departments of Public Works and Recreation and Parks has been working to develop designs for a vibrant Conservatory and garden.

Now is the time to become a part of the process and offer your input and suggestions for developing the Master Plan and future programming. Please tell your neighbors and friends! If you can help with publicity and phone calls, please let us know. We need a great turn out to show the City just how many Friends the Conservatory has.

Two other dates to save: Saturday, March 16, 9:00 to 1:00 is the next Gardening Day in our Butterfly Garden. Come dig in the dirt and enjoy good company at the garden on Joost between Baden and Congo.

On Sunday, April 21, 1:00 to 3:00, a public reception with Artist Lee Walton and participants in his Master Class for Visual Artists will be held at the Conservatory, located at 236 Monterey, between Baden and Congo.

A graduate of the CCAC MFA program and a resident at the Headlands Center for the Arts, Lee Walton is a conceptual artist whose projects are full of humor, detailed planning, and interaction with the outside world. Serendipitous combinations of rule and chance, Walton's drawings, perfornance, video and music compositions are always playful, precisely calibrated, conceptually on target and deeply attentive to the everyday patterns and rhythms of contemporary city life. Better Neighborhoods 2002

Phelan Loop Improvements Focus Of Balboa Park Station Area Meeting

Balboa Park BART/Muni station improvements and a concept for revitalizing the Ocean Avenue commercial district are the focus of Better Neighborhoods 2002's efforts in our area.

The group will present an update to the Planning Commission on March 14 at 1:30 in Room 400 at City Hall.

On March 20 at 7:00, the Planning Department and Muni will host a meeting to discuss their proposal for redeveloping the Phelan Loop and reconfiguring its bus terminal. The meeting will be held at the Lick-Wilmerding School cafeteria, 755 Ocean Avenue. The Art Master Plan, part of the Area Plan, will also be discussed.

BART is working along with Better Neighborhoods to improve access to the Balboa Park Station, the most heavily used station in the system outside of downtown San Francisco.

Better Neighborhoods 2002 is an effort by the SF Planning Department to improve targeted areas in the city. The Balboa Park Station Plan is one of its three initial efforts. More than 200 residents and merchants worked to generate proposals for the area during three community workshops held last September.

Making Ocean, Geneva and San Jose Avenues more attractive and safer for all users, especially pedestrians, was one proposal. Others include: reconfiguring the station with better access, waiting space and lighting; developing housing, shops and services near the station; and implementing changes to make limited parking resources work for everyone. Integration of the Phelan Loop into the neighborhood with open space, affordable housing and retail is a topic of ongoing discussion and will be the focus of the March 20 meeting at Lick-Wilmerding. All interested area residents are encouraged to attend and take part in the planning process.

Group Invites Local Residents To "Imagine Your Park;" Community Picnic in the Works

It has felt like a lifetime, but finally details are coming together allowing residents to get back to "Imagine Your Park" at Sunnyside Playground.

First, the four-year holdup of picnic tables has now ended and installation is scheduled for springtime picnics. Second, several years of intense work has resulted in the Recreation and Park Department's Dog Policy (www.parks.sfgov.org) becoming ready for Commission review and ratification. This policy will resolve the issue of off-leash dogs in Sunnyside, as required before renovation designing can proceed, and community meetings can now resume and final plans drawn up.

The Sunnyside Park Families & Neighbors (SPFN, "the Families group"), is planning the annual community picnic (date to be announced) to celebrate this good news and get a fresh start at creating a family-friendly neighborhood park. The tables and barbecue grill will be christened with the usual good eats. Neighbors will reacquaint themselves after a long separation, share games and look to the future by recalling dormant ideas and renew a commitment to one of the finest neighborhood assets.

SPFN looks to identify every neighborhood resource that collectively could expedite some facilities, like a kid's playground, while major renovations will still depend on the Recreation & Park Department's Capital Renovation Program. To that end, all community volunteer efforts add up to match grant, bond and foundation dollars.

In order to learn and benefit from others, SPFN is following the community process of the Neighborhood Park Council's "The Playground Campaign" (www.playgroundcampaign.org) at Crocker Amazon. Like them, SPFN asks that every neighbor step forward to become a part of a campaign of our own to design and build that children's playground while your kids are still kids. Every form of help is needed; professional (land-scape, construction, cement, seismic, grant writing, etc.) and just plain hard workers (fund raising, banner painting, envelope stuffing, shovel digging, etc.).

The only requirement is an eagerness to see results and keeping an eye on the prize. It will take all of us "doing what we can, when we can" (SPFN mission statement) to create something that will serve the community into a long and *fun* future.


