Dr. Margaret Penn, Sunnyside Principal

Margaret Lucille Penn, an educator who spent 20 years as a San Francisco elementary school principal and cared as much about teaching multiculturalism as she did about teaching reading and math, has died.

Mrs. Penn died Nov. 19 of a brain tumor at UCSF Medical Center with her husband and two sons by her side. She was 61.

She brought her love of multiculturalism to Sunnyside Elementary, a San Francisco school struggling with the challenges of educating the poor and those whose first language is not English.

During her two decades as principal there, Mrs. Penn started an international day where students and their parents cook ethnic meals and participate in a fashion show that celebrates their cultures. She also helped create a monthly program run by different classes on such themes as Martin Luther King and Black History Month. Every March, Mrs. Penn also arranged for a troupe of Irish dancers to perform at the school to commemorate St. Patrick's Day.

"All those things that started with her still continue," said Ruby Bell, the school's elementary adviser and community relations specialist. "She just had so much love and so much care."

In 2002, Mrs. Penn retired from Sunnyside, where Bell said she was known as a "disciplinarian — not harsh, but firm."

"She touched people, from the parents to the child," her husband said. "Being an educator was truly in her heart."

SNA Budget Report

Where Does Our Money Go?

As of mid-November, our association's coffers stand at \$2,136. Sounds like a healthy balance, but let's look at our basic expenses for 2004:

Meeting notices (3) – \$700 Candidates Night, including notice – \$750 Newsletters (4) – \$1500 Picnic – \$540

SNA holds four membership meetings per year, each of which is followed by a newsletter mailed to our 200 members. The newsletter alerts members to items of concern to the Sunnyside. Members receive a postcard mailing with an agenda prior to each meeting as a reminder of the upcoming meeting.

Once a year postcards are mailed to all Sunnyside households, allowing us to reach both new residents and long-time residents, all of whom we'd like to have as members.

SNA recently hosted a very successful, well-attended Candidates Night; 13 of 15 candidates running for District 7's seat on the Board of Supervisors spoke to us and answered our questions. While this was a big expense for an organization with a small budget like ours, we felt it was a priority to help our neighbors be informed voters, and to make sure candidates knew about Sunnyside and SNA.

Our first annual picnic incurred expenses for live music, flyers, fees to Rec and Park and incidentals. A great time was had by all and we hope this will become a well attended community tradition. Thank you to the bands for the greatly reduced fees and to the merchants who donated raffle prizes and beverages.

So, please be advised that our very modest dues of \$10 per household and \$25 for businesses are much needed and more than fully spent.

Greenhouse Site Slated for Changes

The following information is taken almost verbatim from the Addendum to Final Environmental Impact Report CCSF Master Plan dated October 14, 2004.

As part of its ongoing development of the main campus, City College of San Francisco has purchased the property located at the west end of Havelock where greenhouses are now located. The greenhouses will be dismantled and the property has been designated for several possible temporary uses:

- Site for one or more one-story, portable classroom/administration buildings; these would be existing buildings already on the campus
- An unpaved parking lot to offset construction parking
- Storage for landscaping materials

It is possible that all three uses may occur simultaneously. Regardless of use, the site will be lit for security purposes. Low-profile lighting would be used.

Use of this site as a parking lot would serve to offset parking lost in other areas of the campus. It should reduce the impact of construction vehicles on neighborhood streets.

An Environmental Site Assessment revealed evidence of elevated levels of arsenic, lead, and chromium, as well as the pesticide Dieldrin, in the soil inside the greenhouse. CCSF, in accordance with the standards, regulations and determinations of local, state and federal regulatory agencies, will remediate by either removing the upper one foot of topsoil and disposing of it in an appropriate landfill, or capping the contaminated soil with a clean soil barrier.

Once construction of the near-term projects on the campus is complete, no parking or other use of the site will be allowed. Any long-term uses will require separate approval and environmental review.

SNA will continue to monitor capital project activity and report any significant issues to the membership.

Sunnyside Neighborhood Association (SNA) sponsored a gathering of parents, kids and neighbors to identify children's playground equipment they would like the Rec. & Park Dept.'s Planning Division to include in Sunnyside Park's new renovation plans.

The SF Traffic Code has been amended, and the Dept. of Parking and Traffic will now replace traffic signs or signals defaced by graffiti with signs treated with graffiti-resistant sheeting; all new signs will have the sheeting.

Members Seek Calmer Traffic

At SNA's November meeting, members signed a Traffic Calming Study request for the Sunnyside Neighborhood. This is the first act and project initiated by the Traffic Calming/Pedestrian Safety Committee chaired by Chris Coghlan.

The study is funded through grants and managed by the Department of Parking and Traffic (DPT). Our request was submitted to DPT November 12. The traffic committee will track the progress of this request and coordinate neighborhood notifications and repsonse. •

Putting Utility Wires Underground

Some blocks in Sunnyside have had ugly overhead utility wires buried, but most have not. Will the situation improve any time soon?

The City sued PG&E some years ago to prod the company to move ahead with burying 42 miles of wires. The resulting project is already several years behind schedule. Once completed, it will still leave miles of streets with overhead wires.

Responding to numerous requests from throughout the city, in late November the Board voted to create a 20-member task force to investigate how to expand the underground utility program, and, just as importantly, how to fund it. Stay tuned.
