Friends of the Urban Forest has announced that, due to a very high level of contributions, they are able to offer Sunnyside residents sidewalk trees at the UNBELIEVABLE price of \$75 each. 

Gorgeous Mosaic Mural Graces Sunnyside School

Even in dreary, rainy weather the sun will always be shining at Sunnyside Elementary School thanks to the beautiful new mosaic mural installed at the front entrance of the school. Black and white photos can't do justice to the vibrant colors of the tiles produced by the entire Kindergarten class and Ms. Capitan's and Ms. Rensman's 4th graders under the supervision of muralist Josef Norris, director and founder of Kid Serve.




When asked why Sunnyside was picked for this project Josef Norris replied, "I am a new Sunnyside Elementary School parent. My son Adi is in Kindergarten at Sunnyside - and I wanted to do a project with his class. I have been running Kid Serve for 11 years and have done 85 of these murals, mostly mosaics, at schools around the Bay Area.

"I have been waiting a long time for a chance to do one at my son's school. I worked with three kindergarten classes and one 4th grade class for 16 weeks creating this mural. Hard to believe - but much of what you see on the mural was made by 5-year-olds laying tile in the classroom."


Kid Serve uses a teaching and learning approach that integrates community service with academic study to enrich learning, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities. That social approach was reflected in Mr. Norris's response to the question of how this project was different from others he has worked on.

"We normally don't work with so many kids, but we wanted to bring the incoming kindergarten parents together. Also, it was technically pretty complicated. But we're very happy with the results. I like to think that the beauty of the mural reflects some of the great work going on inside the school."

The project was funded by grants from the San Francisco Community Challenge Grant Program and California Arts Council and with funds from the Sunnyside Elementary PTA.

Donations Sought For Park, Conservatory

Sunnyside Park and Sunnyside Conservatory look great after recent renovations. Funding for the renovations, however, covered only capital costs – brick-and-mortar construction materials and labor. By law, once the sites are open to the public, such funds cannot be spent on furnishing.

GearUp Fund campaign will solicit tax-deductible donations for table, chairs, equipment and supplies needed in five recently renovated facilities, including our park and conservatory. The campaign is run by San Francisco Parks Trust (SFPT), a non-profit organization that fundraises for and promotes Rec. & Park Dept. facilities. Large banners announcing the campaign are hanging at both parks, and SFPT recently mailed postcards to surrounding residents asking for donations.

GearUp funds are for equipment only, not for program providers or community events. Programs are provided by the Rec. & Park Dept., usually for a fee, or by park advocacy groups who raise money to provide such opportunities.

The Friends of Sunnyside Conservatory (FSC) and Sunnyside Park Families & Neighbors (SPFN) provide almost all community-building events in our two park sites. Residents are encouraged to donate to GearUp for much needed park equipment. Donors can designate their contribution for a specific park or to the Fund in general, and are strongly encouraged to support their local advocacy groups for events.

SPFN is also helping Rec. Director Joe Scott collect much needed equipment for the Park's Clubhouse, 841-0584. Used toys, books, kitchen cookware, silverware, serving plates, mugs, bowls, coffee pots, microwave, etc. in good, clean and reusable condition are appreciated; send a list to SPFamilies@aol.com. Donations for equipment and programs are tax-deductible.

Owners Responsible For Sidewalk Repair

At the February SNA meeting, a neighbor complained that roots of trees planted by Friends of the Urban Forest some years ago have damaged sidewalks near her home.

Sidewalk maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner, not FUF or the city. If sidewalks are damaged due to root expansion, construction, or other reasons, homeowners are required to make repairs.


